Biography

T. Boone Pickens is one of the nation's most successful businessmen, first building one of the nation's largest independent oil company, Mesa Petroleum, and later reinventing himself in his 70s as one of the most successful investment fund operators with BP Capital. In July 2008, Boone launched the Pickens Plan (www.PickensPlan.com), a grass-roots campaign aimed at reducing this country's crippling addiction to OPEC oil.

Boone's 2008 book, *The First Billion is the Hardest*, also detailed what this country must do to win back its energy independence. He is also aggressively pursuing a wide range of other business interests, from alternative energy options to Clean Energy, a clean transportation fuels company he founded and took public in May 2008 (the eighth entity he has helped go public in his career).

CNBC has dubbed him "Oracle of Oil" for his uncanny knack of predicting oil price movements. His many professional honors include membership in the Horatio Alger Association of Distinguished Americans, the Texas Business Hall of Fame, and the Oklahoma Hall of Fame. In 1998, the Oil & Gas Investor listed him as one of the "100 Most Influential People of the Petroleum Century." During the span of his career, Pickens has given away more than \$1 billion to philanthropic causes. He is among the most generous university benefactors of all time, having contributed more than \$500 million to his alma mater, Oklahoma State University, divided evenly between academics and athletics.

Biography

Sally Jewell was sworn in as the 51st Secretary of the Department of the Interior on April 12, 2013.

Prior to her confirmation, Jewell served in the private sector, most recently as President and Chief Executive Officer of Recreation Equipment, Inc. (REI). Jewell joined REI as Chief Operating Officer in 2000 and was named CEO in 2005.

Before joining to REI, Jewell spent 19 years as a commercial banker, first as an energy and natural resources expert and later working with a diverse array of businesses that drive our nation's economy. Trained as a petroleum engineer, Jewell started her career with Mobil Oil Corp. in the oil and gas fields of Oklahoma and the exploration and production office in Denver, Colo. where she was exposed to the remarkable diversity of our nation's oil and gas resources.

Jewell is a graduate of the University of Washington. She and her husband, Warren, have two adult children, Peter and Anne

Biographies

Representative Rob Bishop

Representative Bishop served sixteen years in the state legislature, including as Majority leader and the unanimously elected Utah Speaker of the House. He is currently serving his sixth term as a member of the House of Representatives.



Bishop serves on the House Natural Resources Committee, and is Chairman of the House Natural Resources Public Lands and Environmental Regulation subcommittee. He is the co-founder of the Western States Coalition and past Chair of the Congressional Western Caucus.

Prior to being elected he spent twenty-eight years as a high school teacher in Utah, focusing on American History and Government.

Before coming to Congress, Rob was active in community theater, which is how he met his wife many years ago. As an avid baseball fan, Rob is a season ticket holder to the Salt Lake Bees and has coached in multiple leagues. He is married to Jeralynn Hansen Bishop. They have five children and six grandchildren.

He graduated *magna cum laude* from the University of Utah with a degree in Political Science.

Jamie Williams

President Jamie Williams joined The Wilderness Society in 2012. Jamie leads The Wilderness Society in its mission to inspire Americans to care for our wild places.



Jamie brings a wealth of experience, and a track record of outstanding achievement, to his role. Before coming to The Wilderness Society, Jamie led The Nature Conservancy's work to protect large landscapes in North America. There he focused on helping Conservancy programs and key partners protect large landscapes through innovative, private and public finance. He also spearheaded critical efforts to secure conservation funding in Congress, among many other accomplishments.

Previously, Jamie also served as the Conservancy's Northern Rockies Initiative Director (2007–2010) and Montana State Director (1998–2007). Jamie started working for The Nature Conservancy in 1992 as its NW Colorado Program Manager (1992-1997).

Jamie came to conservation as a western river guide and wilderness instructor for the National Outdoor Leadership School.

Jamie holds an M.E.S. from the Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Studies and a B.A. from Yale University.

Ronald Jibson

Mr. Jibson is Chairman, President and CEO of Questar Corp. Questar Corporation, based in Salt Lake City, Utah, is a natural gas-focused energy company with three major lines of business – retail gas distribution, interstate gas transportation and gas production – which are conducted through its three principal subsidiaries: Questar Gas, Questar Pipeline and Wexpro.



Mr. Jibson joined Questar Gas (formerly Mountain Fuel Supply Co.) as a Design Engineer in 1980 and held various engineering and administrative positions including: Senior Vice President of Questar Gas and Questar Corp.; Executive Vice President of Questar Gas Company; and also served as its Vice President of Operations and Director of Engineering.

Mr. Jibson serves as Chairman of the Board of Questar Corporation and all its subsidiaries and has been a director of those entities since July 2010.

He currently serves as Director of the Gas Technology Institute and chair of the Western Energy Institute. He lives in Salt Lake City where he is a director of the Salt Lake Chamber and Utah Economic Development Corp. and Chairman of the Board of Trustees for Utah State University.

Biographies

Dan Ashe

Daniel M. Ashe was confirmed on June 30, 2011 as the 16th Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the nation's principal Federal agency dedicated to the conservation of fish and wildlife and their habitats.

Prior to his appointment as Director, Ashe served as the Service's Deputy Director for Policy beginning in 2009.



Ashe also served as the Science Advisor to the Director of the Fish and Wildlife Service. Appointed to this position in March, 2003, he advised the Service Director and provided leadership on science policy and scientific applications to resource management.

From 1998 to 2003, Ashe served as the Chief of the National Wildlife Refuge System. From 1995 to 1998, Ashe served as the Fish and Wildlife Service's Assistant Director for External Affairs. From 1982 until 1995, Ashe was a Member of the Professional Staff of the former Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Ashe is an avid waterfowl hunter, angler and tennis player.

Ashe earned a graduate degree in Marine Affairs from the University of Washington.

Sam Rauch

Sam Rauch was appointed as the Acting Assistant Administrator for Fisheries on January 17, 2012. He oversees the management and conservation of marine fisheries and the protection of marine mammals, sea turtles and coastal fisheries habitat within the United States exclusive economic zone. The National Marine Fisheries Service protects and preserves the Nation's living marine resources through scientific research, fisheries management, law enforcement, and habitat conservation.



He has served as the Deputy Assistant Administrator for Regulatory Programs since June 2006. In that capacity he oversaw all of the agency's regulatory actions, including those to support protected resources, sustainable fisheries, and habitat conservation. From January 2004 to June 2006, Mr. Rauch served as the Assistant General Counsel for Fisheries. Prior to joining NOAA, he served as a trial attorney and the Assistant Section Chief for the Wildlife and Marine Resources Section of the Environment and Natural Resources Division for the United States Department of Justice.

Mr. Rauch holds a J.D. from Northwestern School of Law of Lewis & Clark College, an M.S. from University of Georgia, and a B.A. from University of Virginia.

Biographies

Michael O. Leavitt

Michael O. Leavitt is the founder and Chairman of Leavitt Partners where he advises clients in the health care and food safety sectors.

In 1993, Leavitt was elected governor of Utah. He served three terms (1993-2003). In 2003, he joined the Cabinet of President George W. Bush, serving in two positions: first as leader of the Environmental Protection Agency (2003-2005) and then as secretary of Health and Human Services (2005-2009).



In previous roles, Leavitt served in the Cabinet of President George W. Bush (Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency and Secretary of Health and Human Services) and as a three-time elected governor of Utah. In 1984, he became chief executive of The Leavitt Group, a family business that is now the nation's second largest, privately-held insurance brokerage.

Leavitt is a seasoned diplomat, leading U.S. delegations to more than 50 countries. He has conducted negotiations on matters related to health, the environment and trade. At the conclusion of his service, the Chinese government awarded him the China Public Health Award – the first time this award has ever been given to a government official.

He earned a bachelor's degree in business while working in the insurance industry. He and his wife Jackie have been married nearly 37 years. They have five children and eleven grandchildren. The Leavitts live in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Gregory P. Poulsen

Greg Poulsen is Senior Vice President and Chief Strategy Officer for Intermountain Healthcare. Mr. Poulsen has had direct responsibility for strategic planning, research and development, marketing, and policy for more than 20 years. He joined Intermountain Healthcare in 1982.

Mr. Poulsen is a Commissioner for the Commonwealth Fund in Washington, DC, a leading health policy think tank. He has been a consultant to the Swedish Health Ministry and has provided counsel on health policy development in several other countries, including Great Britain, Canada, New Zealand, Australia, Norway, and Germany. He is a national faculty member of the Stanford University School of Medicine and a guest lecturer at the Stanford Graduate School of Business.



He serves on the boards of many community organizations and is the past chair of the Utah Foundation, a nonprofit public policy research organization. As a healthcare policy expert, he

has appeared frequently before Congressional committees and participates in many national and international health policy forums.

Christopher Drumm

Christopher Drumm is Senior Vice President for Government and External Affairs of AmeriHealth Caritas. In this capacity, he is responsible for the organization's interactions with Federal, state and local officials; legislative bodies; and other public entities. Drumm develops and implements strategies and programs that advance the business interests of AMFC, and foster positive and effective relationships with all interested stakeholders.

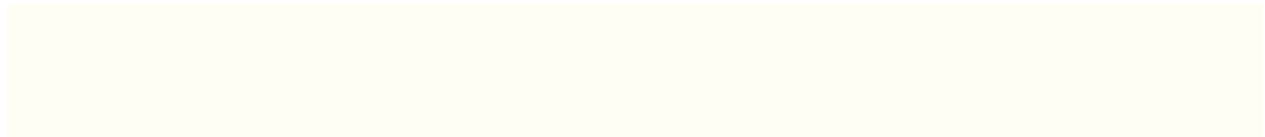


A lifelong Philadelphian, Drumm has over two decades of experience in government and external relations. He has served as a legislative aide to Philadelphia City Council, as a legislative aide to a Member of the United States House of Representatives, as Assistant to the Chairman of the Delaware River Port Authority, and as Vice President for Government Affairs at Saint Joseph's University. Drumm has also worked as a campaign manager for several candidates for public office.

Biographies

Roy Romer

Special Advisor, The College Board

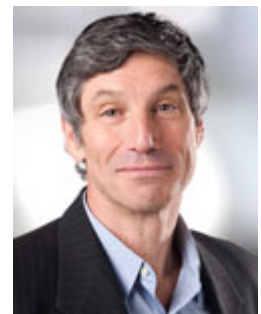
The Honorable Roy Romer was Governor of Colorado for three terms, from 1986 to 1998. Romer was Chairman of the National Governors Association, Chair of the Educational Commission of the States and the National Education Goals Panel. He served as Superintendent of Schools for the Los Angeles Unified School District from 2000 to 2007. Additionally, he served the state of Colorado as State Representative, State Senator, Commissioner of Agriculture and State Treasurer. Romer was in private business as owner/operator of a ski area, a flight school and aircraft FBO; he was involved in John Deere businesses in several states. Most recently, Romer was Chair of Strong American Schools and joined the College Board as senior advisor in March, 2009. He has a degree in agricultural economics from CSU, a law degree from the University of Colorado and studied ethics at Yale University. Romer is father of seven, grandfather of 19.



Daniel Greenstein, Ph.D.

Dr. Daniel Greenstein is the Director of Education, Postsecondary Success at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Before joining the Foundation, Greenstein was Vice Provost for Academic Planning and Programs at the University of California Office of the President. He had administrative responsibility for system-wide academic programs – the University of California Press, the California Digital Library, the University's Education Abroad Program and internship programs in Washington DC and Sacramento – and acted as the director for UC Online Education – a new effort to integrate online education into the university's undergraduate curriculum.



Greenstein has led, in some cases founded, several internet-based academic information services in the US (the California Digital Library) and the United Kingdom (the Arts and Humanities Data Service), and served on boards and acted in strategic consulting roles for educational, cultural heritage, and information organizations.

He holds degrees from the Universities of Oxford (DPhil) and Pennsylvania (MA, BA) and began his professional life as a senior lecturer in Modern History at Glasgow University.

Robert W. Mendenhall, Ph.D.

Robert W. Mendenhall has been President of Western Governors University (WGU) since 1999, the same year the university enrolled its first students. WGU is a private, not-profit, online university offering competency-based degrees, meaning that students earn degrees by



demonstrating competency — what they know and can do — rather than by accumulating a certain number of credit hours or clock hours.

WGU currently offers bachelor's and master's degrees in business, information technology, K-12 teacher education, and healthcare (including nursing). The university has more than 38,000 students in all 50 states, and continues to grow at over 30 percent annually.

Dr. Mendenhall has more than 25 years of experience in the development, marketing, and delivery of technology-based education. Prior to joining WGU, he was general manager of IBM's K-12 education division, overseeing a \$500 million worldwide business. From 1980 to 1992, he was a founder, president, and CEO (from 1987) of Wicat Systems, Inc., a publicly traded company which was a leader in providing computer-based curriculum, instructional management and testing to schools, and technology-based training to government and industry.

Neil Ashdown

Neil Ashdown is President of iSchool Campus. Prior to joining iSchool he served as chief of staff for Governor Jon M. Huntsman, Jr., after serving previously as deputy chief of staff for policy. Prior to his role in the Huntsman administration, Ashdown served as deputy director of the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget and as the chief economist to governors Leavitt and Walker. Ashdown is also the past president of the Wasatch Front Economic Forum, the Utah chapter of the National Association for Business Economics.



Ashdown received his doctorate in political science with a focus in international political economy, public policy, and administration from the Nelson A. Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy at the State University of New York (SUNY) in Albany.

Biography

Bob Perciasepe

Bob Perciasepe is currently both the Acting Administrator and the Deputy Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Bob Perciasepe continues a career spanning nearly four decades as one of the nation's leading environmental and public policy figures. An expert on environmental stewardship, advocacy, public policy, and national resource and organizational management, Perciasepe is widely respected within both the environmental and U.S. business communities.



His extensive experience includes service both inside and outside of government. He served as a top EPA official in the administration of President Bill Clinton, who appointed him, first, to serve as the nation's top water official and later as the senior official responsible for air quality across the U.S. Prior to being named to his current position, he was chief operating officer at the National Audubon Society, one of the world's leading environmental organizations. He has also held top positions within state and municipal government, including as Secretary of the Environment for the State of Maryland and as a senior official for the City of Baltimore.

Perciasepe holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Natural Resources from Cornell University and a master's degree in planning and public administration from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University. He and his wife have two adult daughters.

Biography

Mr. Poneman is the Deputy Secretary of Energy. Under the leadership of Secretary of Energy Steven Chu, Mr. Poneman served as Chief Operating Officer of the Department.

Mr. Poneman first joined the Department of Energy in 1989 as a White House Fellow. The next year he joined the National Security Council staff as Director of Defense Policy and Arms Control.

From 1993 through 1996, Mr. Poneman served as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Nonproliferation and Export Controls at the National Security Council. His responsibilities included the development and implementation of U.S. policy in such areas as peaceful nuclear cooperation, missile technology, space-launch activities, sanctions determinations, chemical and biological arms control efforts, and conventional arms transfer policy.

Prior to assuming his responsibilities as Deputy Secretary, Mr. Poneman served as a principal of The Scowcroft Group for eight years, providing strategic advice to corporations on a wide variety of international projects and transactions. Between tours of government service he practiced law for nine years in Washington, D.C. - first as an associate at Covington & Burling, later as a partner at Hogan & Hartson - assisting clients in regulatory, policy and transactional matters, international arbitration, commercial real estate financing, export controls, and sanctions and trade policy.

Mr. Poneman received A.B. and J.D. degrees with honors from Harvard University and an M.Litt. in Politics from Oxford University. He has published widely on national security issues and is the author of *Nuclear Power in the Developing World* and *Argentina: Democracy on Trial*. His third book, *Going Critical: The First North Korean Nuclear Crisis* (coauthored with Joel Wit and Robert Gallucci), received the 2005 Douglas Dillon Award for Distinguished Writing on American Diplomacy. Mr. Poneman is a member of the Council of Foreign Relations.
